Our SPIRIT St. Leo practices a radical hospitality rooted in Ignatian Spirituality.

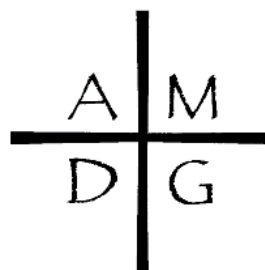
We seek to be poor with the poor, and it is through the communal prayer of the people that we stay inspired and undeterred in our commitment to work with God in the transformation of injustice.

Supportive Services:

Vision Statement - Provide supportive interventions in the form of advocacy, effective referrals, in-kind support, and limited financial aid to help stabilized individuals and families. We provide support in the areas of employment, home stability, personal identity document search/procurement and problem solving.

All clients seeking financial assistance will be required to make an appointment prior to their visit for assistance. Walk-in will only be for clothing, hygiene items and one-time public transit assistance.

The general profile of those we serve are:

- Individual seeking employment or in need of support keeping and retaining employment.
- Individuals and families in need of limited/short-term interventions to retain housing and meet basic needs.
- Individuals struggling to secure personal identity papers or state ID.
- Individuals seeking limited financial assistance with medical or prescription coverage.
- Unhoused individuals in need of clothing and personal hygiene items.

L' Honey Program: is a collaborative venture between St. Leo Parish and L'Arche Farm promoting sustainable beekeeping. We operate four small apiary sites and produce our own hive products. Beekeeping during the honeybee season (June through September). Beehive Product Making: Work with beekeepers, volunteers, and youth.

- ✓ **NOTE:** The L'Honey Beekeeper is willing to work with educators and student groups in the promotion of sustainable beekeeping and caring for our environment.

Social Justice Committee: Partners In Social and Ecological Justice

In Brief, we will be working more closely with our partners at Ignatian Solidarity Network on the planning of the Ignatian Northwest Advocacy Summit 2024. This 3-day summit focuses on standing with our Natives Sisters and Brother's on the protection of Salmon and its habitat. Also, the event will propose to engage youth on social justice issues such as Salmon and to help empower the next generation of social justice advocates.

Volunteer Opportunities:

We will operate in volunteer teams. The program will operate Tuesdays through Fridays depending on our volunteer staffing abilities. Volunteers commit from 2 to 6 hours a day with breaks as needed. Each shift will have a **Primary Volunteer** who will engage, assess, and suggest interventions to meet client needs. This may include financial assistance, advocacy, or community referrals. The **Secondary Volunteer** will engage clients and help with clothing, personal hygiene needs and one-time, qualified/confirmed public transit needs.

The Music Ministries

The St. Leo Church Music Ministry: Enhances our worship and facilitates the full, active, conscious participation and engagement of the St. Leo community through varied genres of liturgical music at both:

- The 5 PM Saturday Evening Mass
- The 9:30 AM Sunday Morning Mass

The St. Leo Choir: Is comprised of dedicated singers who rehearse together most Thursday evenings from 6:30-8:00 and sing for the 9:30 am liturgy on Sundays from September to June, plus special liturgies. The Saturday 5 pm mass is served by a rotating schedule of ensembles which include a cantor, a pianist, and additional instruments.

Cantors: Serve as psalmists and animate the community in their special role as leader of song and may serve at funerals and weddings.

A variety of *instrumentalists* support the singing of the assembly.

Music ministers rehearse for an hour before each liturgy and have additional rehearsals for Christmas, Triduum, and special liturgies.

The Food Bank – Provides daily food support to as many as 300 families in need

Food Bank Drivers use Food Connection vehicles to pick up food donations from various locations in the Tacoma area. Monday – Saturday opportunities available.

Warehouse Assistants assist with unloading truck deliveries. This is an active position and is especially needed on Mondays and Fridays.

Food Line Assistants aid customers as they go through the food line to select the appropriate amounts of food allotted to them depending on their family size. Also help them in carrying food to vehicles as needed. Tuesday – Saturday opportunities available.

Donation Processors process incoming food donations, including sorting miscellaneous donations, re-bagging bulk donations. Monday – Saturday opportunities available

Computer Operators are responsible for assisting customers with check-in before they can select from the food available on the food line. Tuesday-Saturday opportunities available.

Data Entry Assistants help Food Connection staff with basic data entry. Monday – Saturday opportunities available

Children's Feeding Program – Supports up to 2000 hungry kids each week with daily lunch, weekend food, and/or daily snack or take-home item.

Backpack Program Packers assemble bags with shelf-stable food, repack bulk food items into individual servings, pack family-sized meal options, pack fresh produce and organize bags for delivery. Monday – Friday opportunities available.

Backpack Delivery Drivers use Food Connection vehicles or their personal vehicle to pick up backpack bags from our warehouse each week and deliver the food to designated schools based on need. Thursday and Friday opportunities available.

Summer Meals assist Summer Meals staff with meal preparation and deliveries during summer months. Monday – Friday opportunities available.

Adult Faith Formation RCIA The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is a prayerful and reflective journey through which an adult seeker, who is not Catholic, may inquire about the Catholic faith, and if desired, move forward to celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

RCIA is a step-by-step process which invites the seeker to draw closer to God and the Catholic community. After this pilgrimage, participants will ultimately decide if it is their desire to receive the Sacraments of Initiation and come to full communion in the Roman Catholic Church.

To be in communion is to be connected to the people of God, sisters, and brothers by our common Baptism, living a life of conversion to God, and God's son, Jesus Christ, through the Holy Spirit.

Conversion of heart and the RCIA experience is facilitated through involvement in the vital life of the local Catholic community.

In the St. Leo community, those seeking baptism will be instructed in Catholic beliefs and values as Christians and will be invited to a transformed understanding of one's role in the world.

Is a process through which adults who are not Catholic may inquire about the Catholic faith and, if desired, move forward with Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

RCIA invites participants to grow closer to God and the Catholic community, whether the participant ultimately decides to receive the sacraments of becoming Catholic.

Founded in 1983 by Fr. William Bichsel, S.J and a nurse, to address the unmet healthcare needs of the local neighborhood, it has grown and become a safety network that provides free urgent medical care for those unable to access or afford medical care in Pierce County.

In addition to addressing the basic healthcare needs of the most vulnerable in our community, it is also a referral service which connects related available services for our patient's other unmet needs.

Neighborhood Clinic is open every Monday and Thursday evening (with the exception of holidays) from 5PM to 8PM is staffed primarily by generous volunteers including primary care providers, ARNPs, PAs, nurses, social workers, lab technicians, and medical interpreters.

Finally, we are actively looking to add members to the Finance Council this year.

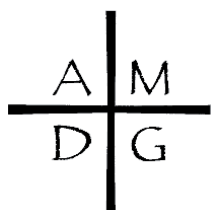
