#### Dear St Leo Parishioners,

May the Lord give you peace! As your pastor, I need to share with you Archbishop Etienne's firm desire that parishes across the Archdiocese of Seattle be more in line with how Eucharist is celebrated as a greater expression of unity in the Eucharist. As such, there will be a couple things that will be affected at St. Leo's.

#### Liturgical Posture

As explained in his 2020 pastoral letter regarding the Eucharist, "The Work of Redemption: Eucharistic Belief and Practice in the Archdiocese of Seattle," our Archbishop is eager to "express and reinforce our unity as a local Church ... and bring us into a unity of posture and practice" with the larger Church.

In that letter, the Archbishop Etienne went on to state his desire that parishes "use common postures across the archdiocese during the Liturgy of the Eucharist and the Communion Rite, in keeping with the *General Instructions of the Roman Missal* and widespread practice in the United States." This means that we would "kneel beginning after the singing or recitation of the Sanctus until after the Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer" and that we would "kneel after the Agnus Dei until it is time to go forward in the Communion procession. Kneeling is a form of adoration." It should be noted that parishioners who are unable to kneel are invited to be seated during those times.

I recognize that this will be difficult, even painful, news for some of our parishioners who experienced after Vatican II that it is appropriate for the baptized to stand at the Liturgy of the Eucharist, since standing is a sign of respect and reverence in our culture. As a Jesuit-led parish for so many years, St. Leo's has enjoyed some latitude in liturgical postures. To let go of the posture of standing in respectful attention may feel to some like slipping back into pre-Vatican II times and may stir up painful memories. From the Archbishop's perspective, it is intended to be a physical expression of the unity of the worshipping community.

#### Sacred Vessels

Liturgical guidelines published in the US Bishops' "General Instructions of the Roman Missal" state that sacred vessels used at Eucharistic celebrations should be made of precious metals. In accordance with this policy, the presider's chalice and Communion cups should be made of silver or gold. While we do have an appropriate chalice on hand, our pewter Communion cups will be replaced. Our crafted wooden Communion bowl, while beautiful in itself, will also be replaced with a vessel that meets the guidelines.

I am aware that these changes will be difficult for some of our parishioners. I urge you to remember, however, that these changes are external. While they may symbolize internal perspectives, they need not cause us to forget that what is essential to us as Catholics is our belief in the real presence of Christ in Eucharist and our belonging as members of his Mystical Body. May our faith and our commitment to one another remain strong as we persevere through the struggle of accepting change!

#### **Timeline**

While parishes were instructed to implement the changes in years past, we, at St. Leo's, will initiate the change of liturgical practices on the First Sunday of Advent, December 1, 2024. If you are having difficulty processing this news, I encourage you to reach out to one of the following parish leaders. They will listen to you with understanding and will do whatever they can to support you during this time.







# Youth Masses

# Our History of Social Justice: A Rich History of Faith in Action – The Story Continues

Throughout the history of our parish, we have responded to the signs of the times with open minds, hearts and hands. Change and challenges have always been more of an opportunity to grow deeper in our faith and more creative in our actions—being Good News to our Sisters and Brothers & all of Creation!

Our story continues leaving off in the 70's and 80's:

- > 1979 Guadalupe House with the Catholic Worker and G-Street Community began to form. Nativity House opens on Market Street A drop-in center for those in need
- > 1980 the Catholic Community Service's Hospitality Kitchen opens, serving hots meals to all who are hungry
- ➤ 2008 Our Emergency Services program begins expanding its services with increased financial support and community grants
- ➤ 2008 Food Connection's Children's Feeding Program starts at Carver Elementary with 50 children in the program. In 2024 the program now serves 1,700 children at 42 schools!
- ➤ 2009 St. Leo Parish & Food Connection work to start up The L'Honey Project promoting our connection to the natural world and where our food comes from!
- ≥ 2010's The parish strives to be more open to LGBTQ community
- 2021 St. Leo Continues to expand Social Supportive Services (E-Services) with a Clothing Boutique that was developed by parishioner Betsy Tustison (Historical recollections are by: Bill Orrange, Dawn Whitman & Rick Samyn)

THE PRESENT: There are efforts afoot to revive our work of Advocacy in the area of food justice and sustainability as well as other important social justice issues. We continue to grow as a parish and to be a force for good! St. Leo Parish will continue to undergo changes as that is a fact of life. However, it is in our hands as to how WE express the fundamental values of the Gospel and Catholic Social Teachings.




