

Food Justice Ministry: The Work is Beginning – JOIN US!

We will be meeting with Clair Lane, Director of the Anti-Hunger & Nutrition Coalition on Sunday, January 12th from 11:30am to 1:00pm in Bix Hall/Classroom. We will discuss the current situation regarding food justice. This event begins our education on the issues of Childhood Hunger and Food Security. We are entering a critical legislative year. We face a large fiscal deficit in our State Budget that threatens food nutrition programs. Also, the looming challenge in crafting the national Farm Bill. A Farm Bill that needs to support the nutrition needs of vulnerable citizens and is forward thinking in supporting family farms and protecting the environment. This is not the time to disengage!

During the months of <u>January</u>, <u>February</u> & <u>March</u> we will offer monthly service-learning events and scheduled Zoom meetings with anti-hunger advocates as we prepare for Hunger Action Day – 2025. Our work will not end at Hunger Action Day but is intended to continue throughout the year as we build good working relationship with our State Representatives and keep abreast of developing legislation and the ever-changing needs of our community.

ST LEO PARISH PARISH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

Meeting Date: November 26 2024

The meeting was called to order at 6:35 PM.

The meeting opened with the land acknowledgment, "We gratefully honor and acknowledge that we rest on the traditional lands of the Puyallup People where they make their home and speak the Twulshootseed language."

A group opening prayer was Led by Eugena in honor of November Native American Heritage Month..

1. Topic: Parish Financial Report: Shanon Koenen

Shanon provided a summary of parish finances through the current time. Through the challenges presented by the transition, she is continuing to work on completing a budget for the current fiscal year. She reported that overall parish collections are only slightly behind collections from the previous year through the same time. And that overall parish income was doing fine. She reported expenses are in line with expectations. She outlined funds currently in the bank and communication underway in clarifying funds being held specific to the work of the Food Connection. A preliminary budget had been presented to the Food Connection and was in the process of further discussion towards becoming final. The parish budget is also being finalized with the Finance Council.

Shanon further reported on the many challenges she and other parish staff are dealing with during the transition period, and that she and parish bookkeeping now share responsibilities for St. Charles Parish as well as St. Leo. Demands upon her time are many and pull her in different directions. Accounting is being maintained for both parishes. She described that the parish would benefit from additional volunteers to help in different areas of work and she described some areas she would like assistance with now. Some council members volunteered to help her with some of those tasks moving forward. In summary, the transition mandated by Partners in the Gospel presents many challenges that are still being worked out.

A long discussion took place involving all council members, parish staff and the meeting guests dealing with the challenges and changes brought by Partners in the Gospel. These impact both parish operations and parish culture. Challenges are being

thrust on parish staff, parishioners and our priests during this time of transition. The conversation of the meeting recognized that things are different because of the factors influencing inevitable changes within the diocese, the parishes in the diocese, parish communities and further compounded for St. Leo parishioners by the loss of our long history as a Jesuit parish. The vision of Partners in the Gospel asks us all to consider 3 questions: Who are we? Who do we want to be? How do we get there? The answers to these questions will emerge from work and prayer over time. We ask for patience, listening, and open communication on all sides as we move forward.

Decision/Action: Parish Staff, Father Michael and parish council for planning and implementation

Responsibility for Follow-up: Parish Staff, Father Michael and parish council

2. Topic: Pastor Report:

Father Michael updated the Council on several matters. He stated there are two pastoral staff positions that will serve both parishes that have been posted but are not filled. The shortage of personnel to serve both parishes is putting additional demands upon his and the existing staff's time, that could be reduced if qualified candidates can be found and hired.

He discussed his responsibility with the St. Charles office space construction project. This is viewed as a sixteen-month project and will be completed about a year from now. He said there are two other smaller St. Charles projects underway dealing with creation of a preschool and early learning center to operate in the former convent building. St. Charles School currently has its largest enrollment ever and is the second largest archdiocesan parish school. A fundraising effort is underway for replacement of the school's outdoor field.

Father Michael also reported on the fence project for St. Leo's and the surrounding campus. An agreement has been reached to split the cost of this work with CCS. Plans have been prepared, a permit applied for and work could begin late winter or Spring. Father Michael also wants to investigate what other inner-city parishes have done, and St. Leo could do, to make their parishes more inviting and welcoming to the communities they serve, once security updates have been accomplished. The parish is also reviewing issues with the replacement of the parish sign on Yakima Avenue.

Father Michael also reported on building assessments of the condition of the three parish buildings on the St. Leo campus. This involved an assessment of the church, the rectory and Bichsel Hall. The assessment of the status of each of these is that the rectory building has significant needs requiring upgrades, the church is currently felt to be in decent condition and Bichsel Hall is in great condition with no significant needs.

Father Michael reported on the opening of the new entrance into the Food Connection that recently opened. A blessing was provided by Bishop Schuster. He reported that school children from Holy Rosary, All Saints and St. Charles volunteer periodically at the Food Connection. He also discussed anxiety being felt by many Latino families over the impact of future immigration enforcement, and raised the question as to what the parish can do to help support them.

He also asked for an ad hoc committee to work on communications with the parish as we progress through changes. Deacon Tom, Emily, John and Allison volunteered to work with the priests on this.

3. Topic: Commission Reports:

Minutes from the commissions were provided to the Council for review in advance of the meeting. Due to the length of the meeting no specific discussion of the minutes took place.

Closing Prayer. A closing prayer was led by Sarah.
