

A Portrait: Father Michael Radermacher Pastor of St. Leo and St. Charles Borromeo Parishes

Father Michael was born in Lynnwood, Washington. He's the oldest with four sisters. His youngest sister was born when he was a senior at Lynnwood High School. He graduated from LHS in 1980. He attended St. Pius X School, Mountlake Terrace, before high school.

While growing up, Father Michael worked with his dad and uncles in woodworking. "When I was a kid, I helped install pews that my father and uncles built in local churches. I was seven or eight years old." After high school, Father Michael worked as a carpenter in commercial construction across the Western United States for eighteen years.

Father Michael said he never wanted to be a priest. He wanted to be a carpenter. He was months from getting married and the engagement was called off. "I asked God what I should do now. I considered the permanent diaconate because I had no college. I mentioned it to someone and they said, 'I hear priesthood.' I said no, and then I thought maybe God was calling me. I wasn't listening."

Father Michael went to an Open House at St. Edwards Seminary High School, but didn't feel smart and holy enough. He didn't like public speaking. He remembers St. Paul who said, "In my weakness I am strong, to rely on God." He attended Mt. Angel Seminary, Oregon, for undergraduate, for three years. He attended St. John's Seminary in Camarillo, California, for five years. Father Michael enjoyed doing Lighthouse Ministry, a reach out program, doing RCIA, and doing Nursing Home Ministry. He traveled with Catholic Relief Services to Cambodia to see the programs offered there. It's one place where CRS Rice Bowl dollars are spent.

Father Michael was ordained by Archbishop Brunett in 2006. It was the largest Seattle ordination in recent history – seven new priests. Father Michael was assigned to St. Charles Borromeo Parish, Tacoma, with Father Mike McDermott. He also served at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish and School in Vancouver for six years. He was the first Chaplain at Seton Catholic High School when it opened. He was Pastor at All Saints Parish and School, Puyallup, for eleven years, and during nine of those years was also the Pastor of St. Martin of Tours Parish in Fife.

Father Michel's favorite passage from the Bible is, "All you who are thirsty, come to the water!" (Isaiah 55:1). The Isaiah verse is carved into the wooden ambo at St. James Cathedral.

For hobbies, Father Michael likes woodworking, especially using salvaged materials. He lets the chunk of wood determine the project, similar to how Michelangelo allowed marble to shape his art. He likes the outdoors and hiking in the Pacific Northwest. A favorite place is the Sunrise area of Mt. Rainier. Significant movies about the priesthood are *Keys of the Kingdom* and *Diary of a City Priest*.

Father Michael hopes in the vibrant outreach of St. Leo's downtown and in the vibrant school of St. Charles Borromeo, one of the largest in the Archdiocese. "How can both these campuses complement each other in these vibrant ministries rooted in Jesus? They meet the needs of hundreds of people each and every day."

St Leo Supportive Social Service

There was an anonymous note left in the Ye Olde Wooden Box last weekend that read, <u>"Hello!</u> If there's always a shortage of clothes and toiletries for those less fortunate, why isn't part of the ES \$90,000 account balance being used to procure such items"?

The answer to this anonymous statement is this: We have about \$1,000.00 currently earmarked for the Clothing Boutique clothing items and toiletries. However, I consider it prudent to continue to ask for in-kind donations and parishioner support of the Boutique. I want the major bulk of our social services financing to be ready and available to assist those who find themselves in crises related to difficult financial straits that jeopardize their housing, health, transportation and employment. Also, I cannot predict the future other than I fear that future times may even get worse for the *Less Fortunate*. A good reserve for the unpredictable times ahead seems to be a good plan. Our monthly outlay in direct financial assistance is related to the account balance and projected income. We currently are budgeting about \$6,000.00 to \$6,500.00 a month for assistance. This can go up if we are faced with a larger need that we feel compelled to assist from a Moral/Gospel perspective. My decision making is far from perfect, and I often lose sleep over it all.

The Washinton State Legislators are NOW IN SESSION! HB1217/SB 5222 - 2025-26

"Improving housing stability for tenants subject to the residential landlord-tenant act and the manufactured/mobile home landlord-tenant act by limiting rent and fee increases, requiring notice of rent and fee increases, limiting fees and deposits, establishing a landlord resource center and associated services, authorizing tenant lease termination, creating parity between lease types, and providing for attorney general enforcement." (leg.wa.gov)

Food security is tied to hosing security, but Washington's laws don't protect tenants from excessive rent increases, predatory fees, or adequate notice about rent hikes. Excessive rent increases are increasing evictions and homelessness, especially for seniors and people of color. (Anit-Hunger& Nutrition Coalition/2025 Legislative Agenda)
