

Dear Parishioners.

For quite some time the regional Pax Christi International groups have been gathering in Seattle at this time of year to recite the Vow of Nonviolence at St. James Cathedral or another Catholic church.

"Pax Christi" means "Peace of Christ", and Pax Christi International is a Catholic peace movement whose mission is "to transform a world shaken by violence, terrorism, deepening inequalities, and global insecurity." Our local Pax Christi Tahoma group's inspirational leader and founder was Father William Bichsel SJ ("Bix").

Why do we recite the Vow of Nonviolence, and why do we say it at this time of year? Even before Jesus was born and became the living WORD, the prophet Isaiah taught nonviolence in saying that people needed to beat swords into ploughshares. Jesus on numerous occasions taught nonviolence. In the Beatitudes he stated, blessed are the peacemakers as they will be called "Children of God". He taught us to reconcile with our sister, brother, or opponent rather than carry anger in our heart. He told us to not retaliate when we are hit by someone, and he taught us to love our enemies, as we all are creatures of our loving God. And when faced with being taken hostage and crucified, Jesus told his disciple to put his weapon down, and Jesus healed the ear that had been cut off of a soldier who was arresting him. Lastly, when confronted with being murdered, Jesus did not resist but he prayed for and forgave his opponents.

So, at this time of year when we consider making New Year's Resolutions, we also need to consider our own thoughts of being upset or angry with family members, friends, government leaders and Church leaders. And we need to remember that God asks us to do whatever needs to be done, including praying and forgiving, so that we will continue to have God's peace in our hearts.

VOW OF NONVIOLENCE

RECOGNIZING THE VIOLENCE IN OUR OWN HEARTS, yet trusting in the goodness and mercy of God, we fervently desire to practice the nonviolence of Jesus who taught us in the Sermon on the Mount: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the sons and daughters of God...You have learned how it was said, 'You must love your neighbor and hate your enemy;' but I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you. In this way, you will be daughters and sons of your Creator in heaven."

Before God the Creator and the Sanctifying Spirit, we seek to live out of the love and example of Jesus:

- by striving for peace within ourselves and seeking to be peacemakers in daily life;
- by accepting suffering rather than inflicting it;
- by refusing to retaliate in the face of provocation and violence;
- by persevering in nonviolence of tongue and heart;
- by living conscientiously and simply so that we do not deprive others of the means to live;
- by actively resisting evil and working nonviolently to abolish war and the causes of war from our hearts and from the face of the earth.

God, we trust in your sustaining love and believe that just as you gave us the grace and desire to offer this, so you will also bestow abundant grace to fulfill it.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

May the peace of our Lord be with you this Christmas season.

We, the Bishops of Washington State, stand with our brothers and sisters who are immigrants and refugees. The threats of mass deportations and forced separation of families have caused great fear for refugees and migrants and their families—documented and undocumented. These threats are contrary to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the dignity of every human person that is central to the teachings of our Catholic faith.

In his encyclical letter <u>Fratelli Tutti</u>, Pope Francis reminds us, "If every human being possesses an inalienable dignity, if all people are my brothers and sisters, and if the world truly belongs to everyone, then it matters little whether my neighbor was born in my country or elsewhere" (#55).

While we uphold that we are a nation of laws, as we've stated in the past, we also know that the U.S. immigration system is severely flawed and in need of a comprehensive overhaul. As Christians we know our love for God is measured by our love of neighbor, particularly the most vulnerable. Rooted in Scripture, the Catholic Church has a long tradition of standing with those forced to migrate, "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me" (Mt 25:35). Therefore, we cannot separate our love for God from our love for others, as we echo Pope Francis' call to welcome, protect, promote and integrate immigrants (*Fratelli Tutti* 129).

Even the Statue of Liberty reminds us that migration is part of the fabric of our nation, with a line from Emma Lazarus, a Jewish-American immigrant author, engraved on its pedestal: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free."

During this time of uncertainty and fear, we stand with our immigrant and refugee brothers and sisters. May all our brothers and sisters on the margins, especially migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, know that our parishes are open for prayer, comfort and solace. May each of us embrace the Gospel teaching and Pope Francis' call to recognize the dignity of others as we welcome the stranger.

As pilgrims of hope entering into a Jubilee year, we journey together through these uncertain times knowing Our Lady of Guadalupe walks with us.

Our Lady of Guadalupe, pray for us!
